
#### BACKPACK SOCIETY

#### THE CRISIS CENTER

Established in 1985, the Crisis Center exists to end domestic violence through advocacy, education and prevention. The Crisis Center offers free, confidential services including a 24-hour crisis line (303-688-8484), emergency shelter, therapy, legal advocacy and community-based advocacy for adults and children impacted by domestic violence, as well as community outreach. The Crisis Center serves the 18th and 23rd judicial districts, which include Arapahoe, Douglas, Elbert, and Lincoln counties. ### HELP & HOPE CENTER

Help & Hope Center supports Douglas and Elbert County residents in financial distress to navigate troublesome times with dignity. Last year, the organization helped over 30,000 people with over \$3.1 million in emergency assistance.

They include the unhoused and people in danger of losing their homes, seniors on fixed incomes, those who have become full-time caretakers for family members and many others. Services include housing and utility assistance, as well as providing food, dothing and household items from a food pantry and thrift store.
